## Annual Update on the AAUW of Orange, Durham and Chatham

The AAUW Orange, Durham, Chatham leadership team and members have worked diligently and collaboratively to meet the goals identified as part of our Futures Planning process, initially undertaken in 2016 and updated in fall 2017. Areas of focus include: expanding outreach and partnerships; increasing membership; providing opportunities to expand networks- both professional and social; and increasing responsiveness to the needs of more diverse membership and potential members (updating the where, when and how of our traditional events, communications and structures.)

Accomplishments of note:

A 31% increase in membership (16 people) during the past year. Total membership 59. This is due in significant part to the dedicated and energetic efforts of our membership chair, Michele Hoyman and her com-

mittee.

- An engaging array of monthly programs that include topics in support of the AAUW mission were created and organized by our Program Committee under the Leadership of Dr. Donna Wilson. These included: Student Loan Debt: Separating Fact from Fiction; ALEC's Model Legislation: Inception, Implementation and Intrigue; Advocacy and Social Change: Realization, Resources and Resiliencelearning from our NC Fellows; A Lotta Love: Helps Improve Homeless Shelters for Women and Children; STEM- A Panel of Practioners Offer Their Perspective and Advice; and Mixing Business and Pleasure-Celebrating and Networking.
- The ODC once again provided financial support for the UNC Schwenning Scholarship and was happy to have Gale Greenlee, this year's recipient be part of the February plenary session.
- We partnered with an array of organizations most

recently with UNC Women's and Stone Center and NAACP for a showing of Ava Duvernay's Documentary 13<sup>th</sup> and with Carolina Central Community College for a NC AAUW grant funded session of WorkSmart and its trainer of trainers companion seminar.

- ODC sponsored a grant for the UNC CH Women's Center and successfully submitted a grant to NC AAUW in support of an upcoming Womxn of Worth Conference.
- o ODC added a position for Policy and ran a regular column in the monthly newsletter to ensure members are kept up to date on issues of significance for women. Past President Bea Keller continues to ably fill this role.
- Next year the Board will officially add a University Outreach and Partnership position. This allows us to take advantage of the interests and skills of Donna Wilson, who has both served at the state and national level in this regard. This will help us

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## "Careers in Engineering and Related STEM Fields – Insights from the Front Lines"

**Speakers: Panel of Female Engineers and Environmental Scientists** 

Monday, April 16, 2018; Time: Noon to 12:50 Place: Central Carolina Community College (CCCC), Chatham Campus, Bldg. 42, Room 109



In collaboration with CCCC, AAUW-ODC has organized a panel of young women scientists and engineers, with diverse backgrounds and jobs, who will share their experiences and discuss the challenges, lessons learned, and rewards in their fields. They range from current graduate students to established professionals. Our own members also can learn about the challenges of recruiting and retaining women in STEM careers.

<u>Directions</u>: CCCC – Chatham is co-located with the

Chatham Community Library (see campus map at http:// www.cccc.edu/locations/ chatham/maps/ ChathamCampus.pdf.) From the Chapel Hill area, drive south on 15-501 towards Pittsboro. Merge onto Rt. 64W towards Siler City and go 2.2 miles to EX-IT 381 [NC Highway 87]. Turn left (south) onto Highway 87 and travel approximately 1.8 miles to a traffic circle [Chatham Community Library entrance is immediately to the right]. Drive through the campus to the second building past the library, which is Building 42, Health/Continuing Education. Park anywhere in front.

Please arrive at least 10 minutes early. The panel takes place during a regular class period and will be linked by teleconference to two other CCCC campuses. Following the panel, the meeting room will be available for students and panelists to interact informally.

On May 9 the ODC branch of the AAUW will host its annual scholarship fund raiser. The local, state and national AAUW organizations provide scholarships to women pursuing research through university studies and grants for community based projects that support the achievement and growth of young women as leaders and contributors. The ODC Board's goal for

the year is to host at least 120 guests, each of whom will help continue our legacy of generous support for scholarships- all while enjoying great company and delicious appetizers and desserts.

In addition to feeding the body and soul, this event also feeds the mind as it traditionally includes a presentation by a renowned North Carolinian author who provides insight into her work and inspiration for us all to follow our passions. This year we are indeed fortunate to have as our special guest, Dr. Nancy K. MacLean, author of the timely and much lauded, Democracy in Chains: The Deep History of the Radical Right's Stealth Plan for America.

Dr. McLean, an award winning historian, scholar and

author is currently the William H. Chafe Professor of History and Public Policy at Duke University. Her recognitions are noteworthy and span the course of 20 years. In 1995 she was awarded the Frank L. and Harriet C. Owsley Prize from the Southern Historical Association. In 2007, she received the Philip Taft Labor History Book Award of the Labor and Working Class Studies Association, the Allan Sharlin Book Award for the best book in social science history from the Social Science History Association and the Willard Hurst Prize for best book in socio-legal history from the Law and Society Association. That same year she received the Labor History Best Book Prize from the International Association of Labor History Institutions. In 2010, she was elected a Fellow of the Society of American Historians.

Dr. McLean's books including: Behind the Mask of Chivalry: The Making of the Second Klu Klux Klan and Freedom Is Not Enough: The Opening of the American Workplace, which won seven awards, including the Taft Award for labor history and the Hurst Award for legal history. Other co-authored works include: with Donald Crichlow, Debating the American Conservative Movement: 1945 to the Present and with Edward Peeples, Scalawag: A White Southerner's Journey through Segregation to Human Rights Activism.

In June 2017 Dr. MacLean published Democracy in Chains: The Deep History of the Radical Right's Stealth Plan for America. This text was a finalist for the National Book Award nonfiction category and the winner of the 2017 Lannan Foundation Cultural Freedom Award for a "notable book of particular relevance to the current historical moment." Recently we were notified that The Nation described Democracy in Chains as the "Most Valuable Book of 2017".

Members of ODC who met to discuss the book agreed that the text presented information and posed questions that were thought provoking, enlightening and unsettlingly timely. Despite the fact that the book discussion participants have a history of being

voracious readers with an interest in history and socioeconomic and political events a good number had only faint awareness of much of what is presented in the book. We ended the book discussion feeling more than fortunate that we would get to hear from Dr. McLean in person.

For those that own the book, we are sure you will come with ideas and questions to discuss with others in attendance. For those who have not yet read the book but who are inspired by Dr. McLean's talk (and we know it will be many), books will be available at the event.

We hope members will invite friends and that the general public will participate in support of a great cause. The event is May 9, 2-4PM at Extraordinary Ventures, Chapel Hill. Tickets are \$20 each and can be purchased in advance. 


