Our members probably remember Cara Person who was an AAUW fellow two years ago in Carolina's School of Public Health. She has just taken a position as Director of Public Health Agency Research at Association of State and Territorial Health Officials in the Atlanta Office. Congratulations Cara.

Fall programming for AAUW ODC Branch will have a theme of HERhealth, with particular attention to mental as well as physical well-being.

The first program in the fall series will feature a presentation by Dr. Susan Girdler, a Professor in the Department of Psychiatry, who also serves as Director for the UNC Psychiatry Stress and Health Research Program at UNC Chapel Hill. Dr. Girdler's long-standing research interests include premenstrual dysphoric disorder (PMDD) and perimenopausal depression. Her research has focused on histories of trauma and depression among women with reproductive mood disorders. She will discuss findings from her most recent research on predictors of depression and cardiovascular risk during the menopause transition with analyses based on race. Dr. Girdler received a B.S. in Psychology from University of Florida; M.S. in Counseling Psychology from Nova Southeastern University; and a Ph.D. in Experimental & Biological Psychology from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

For the October meeting, Jodi Flick, Clinical Assistant Professor in the School of Social Work at UNC Chapel Hill, has been invited to share an overview of how to recognize signs of mental health issues, including depression, and will offer recommendations for how to respond.

More than 60 AAUW members and guests attended the event at Extraordinary Ventures in Chapel Hill, enjoyed hors d'oeuvres, and savored remarks from award-winning American journalist and essayist, Hal Crowther.


Crowther, who is a former media critic for *Newsweek* and writer for *Time magazine*, lives locally in Hillsborough with his wife, novelist Lee Smith. His 45minute remarks to AAUW included reading two essays he penned on remarkable women:

- Civil rights activist and educator, <u>Anne Braden</u>, whose inspiring bravery and dedication to racial equality was captured in Crowther's essay on Braden in his recent book (2018), called <u>Freedom Fighters and Hell Raisers</u>.
- Crowther's own mother, whose complicated and changing nature was beautifully captured in his recent, heartfelt essay, which is featured in a new book (2019) called, <u>Mothers and Strangers: Essays on Motherhood</u> <u>from the New South</u>, edited by Samia Serageldin and Lee Smith.

After his two stirring readings, a thoughtful 25-minute discussion among

Minutes of AAUW Meeting: Orange, Chatham, Durham Branch, April 13, 2019, Southwest Library, Durham, NC Speaker: Dr. Kathleen Clarke-Pearson

The meeting was called to order by President Bea Keller. She invited everyone to come to the annual AAUW tea, featuring Hal Crowther, April 23 at 5:30-7 at Extraordinary Ventures. It is our fundraiser for the Schwenning Scholarship Fund which benefits our graduate and undergraduate scholarships. Tickets are \$25, and volunteers are needed to bring finger food.

Michele Hoyman introduced our speaker, Kathleen Clarke-Pearson, MD, who is a pediatrician who has studied the effect of digital media on families, particularly children.

Dr. Clarke-Pearson named the positives and negatives of digital media. Among the positive are use of Google, Text for Baby, which provides support for new parents, How To videos from YouTube, and connection with family and friends. Among the negative are increased addiction among children (and adults). Electric Screen Syndrome is a new diagnosis. And ADHD diagnosis has increased 53% in the last 5 years. In addition to addiction to media like Instagram and Facebook which students check 100 times a day, there is also addiction to video games. Video game designers use <u>persuasive design</u> with a built in reward system to keep the player hooked. Fortnight is particularly addictive. More information is available at the Center for Commercial Free Childhood.

Warning signs of addiction include: Unhappiness when forced to unplug, sneaked screen use, increased anxiety and stress, secret accounts, apps, and passwords. And screen time interferes with family activities and friendships. In addition, kids with smart phones are 100% more likely to view pornography. They get their sex education from porn and this prevents them from having meaningful, intimate relationships.

Social media use by children risks anorexia and bulimia, decreased socialization, cutting, hate, racism, and false information like the immunization scare. Depression and cyber bullying are experienced by 34% of teens; 30% have suicidal thoughts.

As far as remedies go, Dr. Clarke-Pearson recommends that parents teach life skills before tech skills. Have screen-free meals and have all phones parked in a central location overnight. Have screens in a central location, not in kid's room. Develop meaningful connections within the family. Parents might want to check out the American Academy of Pediatrics web page and a book called *Reset Your Child's Brain*.
