Come to the Annual Meeting To Learn About Issues in NC Involving Women and Girls

Keynote Speaker Angie Newsom

Learn how to identify "factual" information in the news media from Angie Newsome, founder of Carolina Public Press, which launched in March 2011. A North Carolina native with a master's degree in journalism from UNC Chapel Hill, Angie has more than 15 years of experience in daily, online and magazine journalism. She has won several awards, including being named one of four New Media Women Entrepreneurs in the country by the McCormick Foundation in 2012. Carolina Public Press has also earned numerous awards for its environmental, mental health and investigative reporting as well as for general excellence among North Carolina's online news organizations.


