

The Status of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA)

In 2019 and 2020, the U.S. celebrates the centennial of the 19th Amendment. Passed by Congress on June 4, 1919, and ratified on August 18, 1920, the 19th amendment granted women the right to vote. But whatever happened to the Equal Rights Amendment, which was passed by the U.S. Senate and sent to the states for ratification in March 1972?

Lori Bunton, Co-President of the ERA-NC Alliance will present a brief overview of the ERA's history, and an update on the status of the ERA. With so much attention now on gender equity for women, people of color, and those who are gender non-conforming or non-binary, Lori will address how the current ERA movement is responding to these 21st century nuances and what steps we can all take to

pursue equality.

Lori has served on the boards of Planned Parenthood in TN and NC., National Organization for Women, as well as President of the North Carolina Alliance for Healthy Communities in Raleigh. She currently serves as Co-President for the ERA-NC Alliance, where she has been a Board member for four

years. Lori has a B.S. in Business Administration from the University of Tennessee. In addition to her service on boards, she volunteers with Dress for Success in Durham, NC as a career coach and serves as an advisor on their career curriculum. Lori has lived all over the U.S. and Europe and now resides in the Raleigh-Durham area.

2020 Young People's Literature Award

AAUW NC Young People's Literature Award was given to Kelly Starling Lyons for her book, *Going Down Home with*Daddy. Appropriate for ages 4 through 9, it recounts a young African-American boy's visit to his paternal grandmother for a family reunion. It takes place in the deep south, and he is able to grasp the

significance of the family farm and his ancestors' accomplishments. Better yet, he is able to express his understanding and appreciation to his grandmother and to his whole family. This year, in keeping with our tradition of rotating AAUW NC's gift among our three counties, a copy was sent to Central Elementary's library in Hillsborough, NC.

AAUW-ODC College and University Partnerships Outreach

August 1. 2020, was this year's opening date for applications to AAUW for fellowship grants and funding to qualified graduate women nationwide for their research, professional development, or community involvement. Annually, AAUW awards more than \$4.3 million dollars in funding for fellowships and grants to more than 270 women nationwide.

Fulfilling AAUW-Orange, Durham, and Chatham Counties' annual goals, our outreach this year has included connections to more than 23 area colleges, universities, or local communities for institutional officials to share this funding information with qualified women who are pursuing varied research and community project initiatives through their respective graduate work or career development opportunities.

Our branch's past outreach efforts have contributed to increased availability of information about funding from AAUW to area colleges and universities, resulting in an average of 4-5 awards annually for the Triangle area. For the 2020 funding year, there were five awards, spanning dissertation fellowship funding, community outreach, and career professional development. Watch for more program details about these award winners who will be invited guests to our Fellows Meeting in February 2021.
