Below in a chart are the important dates for this election. Early voting begins on October 15, but be sure to check the county board of election for exact times for early voting, followed by specific voting sites. Many voters are opting for mail-in (absentee) ballots. Do get your requests for those mail-in ballots in soon. N.C. does not require a reason for an absentee ballot. But the envelope in which you mail back the ballot needs to be witnessed by a family member or other person. If not, it will not be counted. You can track the ballot to make sure it arrives and is "accepted."

NATIONAL AAUW NEWS

The National AAUW has an impressive non-discrimination and inclusion policy. As part of the implementation of this policy, the National Board is recommending that we abolish our educational requirement and allow any person who is in favor of our mission of educational equity to become a member. Personally, I am strongly in favor of this. There will be a chance for all individual members to vote on this change in the spring. We will need a quorum present for the vote to count. I will be asking the local board to support this, although every member should be able to vote her conscience. As one national officer put it, "You don't need a Ph.D. or M.A. or B.A. to know that you are paid less than a man."

A dues increase may be coming, but the amount and the start date will be determined by a vote of the National Board, not by the membership. The amount of increase will be between \$3 and \$10. Jan Holland and I have more information on the justification for this because we attended a national Town Hall. More information will come later after the National Board makes a decision.

- Do you have an idea for a future program for next year?

The Status of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA)

In 2019 and 2020, the U.S. celebrates the centennial of the 19th Amendment. Passed by Congress on June 4, 1919, and ratified on August 18, 1920, the 19th amendment granted women the right to vote. But whatever happened to the Equal Rights Amendment, which was passed by the U.S. Senate and sent to the states for ratification in March 1972?



Lori Bunton, Co-President of the ERA-NC Alliance will present a brief overview of the ERA's history and an update on the status of the ERA. With so much attention now on gender equity for women, people of color and those who are gender non-conforming or non-binary, Lori will address how the current ERA movement is responding to these 21st

century nuances and what steps we can all take to pursue equality.

Saturday, March 20, 2021--Reading and discussion of an excerpt of XIX,

a play written by Jacqueline E. Lawton, faculty member in the Department of Dramatic Art, UNC-Chapel Hill

Synopsis of the Play

In 1920, while many in North Carolina favored granting women the right to vote, there was fear the 19th Amendment would open the doors to greater rights for the state's Black citizens.

Set in Raleigh, North Carolina, *XIX* follows Adelaide, a black suffragette and newlywed into the wealthy, white Germaine family. With access to the political and social elite of Raleigh, Adelaide plans to use her position for the betterment of the black community. She recruits her best friend, Florence, to enlist black women in the fight for suffrage as states across the country ratify the 19th amendment. On the night of North Carolina's historic (and unsuccessful) vote, Adelaide learns that her sister - and mother-in-law have been working quietly to undermine her efforts. In the aftermath of this betrayal, Adelaide must choose between her marriage and her activism. Jacqueline E. Lawton's socio-political drama focuses our attention on the women of an early twentieth-century multi-racial family as they navigate the

fight for equality, the compromises of coalition building, and the limits of "family" love across racial and class divides.

There is Nothing Like A Good Book to Expand Thinking and Inspire Conversation.



Join us on Zoom, **Wednesday, October 21, at noon** as we discuss Ibram X. Kendi's memoir, *How To Be An Antiracist*. This book--which explores the "transformational concept of antiracism"--is a starkly personal work that is unapologetically provocative in what it asks of the

reader. NYT reviewer, Jeffrey Stewart reflects, "What emerges from [the author's] insights is the most courageous book to date on the problem of race in the Western mind, a confessional of self-examination that may, in fact, be our best chance to free ourselves from our national nightmare."

Tentative plans are underway for a year-end donation to the college with an award planned for Spring 2021. Additional details will be available as the year draws to a close.

Minutes from the Sept 26 Program, "Voting in the COVID-19 Era."

On Saturday, September 26, 2020, our AAUW Branch hosted representatives from the <u>League of Women Voters</u> for a virtual discussion called, "Voting in the COVID-19 Era." Twenty-five AAUW members and friends participated in the AAUW program, that included a presentation by Val Gist about how to get informed and vote during this global pandemic.

Gist's presentation was complimented with comments from her colleague, Marley Peterson, a student at American University who is interning with the League of Women Voters. Peterson shared information on the League's dynamic, nonpartisan online platform, called <u>Vote411.org</u>, which is a one-stop shop to help all voters have the information they need to successfully participate in all local, state, and federal elections. A special feature of Vote411.org is the candidate responses and videos on a broad array of topics so that voters can cast an informed vote.

Gist concluded the discussion with an explanation of the three ways to vote in North Carolina:

- 1. Vote by mail through Absentee ballot. The deadline to request your ballot is October 27, 2020.
- 2. **Vote early in-person** with one-stop voting where citizens can register and vote the same day at the polling location of their choice from October 15-31, 2020.
- Vote in-person on Election Day. Election Day is Tuesday, November 3, 2020, from 6:30 a.m.--7:30 p.m. and voters must go to their assigned polling location.
