National AAUW emailed a ballot to each member on April 7. There is a "VOTE NOW" button in the email with a link to your ballot. It takes only a few seconds to complete on line. You may request a paper ballot or let AAUW know if you did not receive the email here: <u>connect@aauw.org</u>.

Look for your ballot! It will be from memberinfo@aauw.org. It's very important that you complete the voting process because it takes five percent (5%) of the national AAUW membership to vote with a two-thirds (2/3) majority to approve a change!

What is on the ballot? The ballot presents the proposal to remove the educational requirement for membership. Our board (ODC branch) unanimously endorsed this at its March board meeting. This change is recommended by the national Board of AAUW and our state (NC) AAUW board as well.

Why do we support making this change? While the AAUW is fiercely committed to the educational attainment of all women, given its commitment to inclusion, including the larger population is simply the right thing to do. Our membership practices should align with our vision and goals. This change acknowledges the reality of alternate pathways to education

and the equity issues that exist related to access and affordability of a traditional college or university degree. AAUW's vision is: **Equity for all**.

March Meeting Summary, XIX

The March 20th meeting was a very special co-sponsored Zoom event with the Carolina Women's Center and PlayMakers Repertory Company. Local playwright Jacqueline Lawton, director Jules Odendahl-James, and UNC undergraduate cast and crew members Kayla Brown, Liz Howard, Aubree Chanel Dixon, and Ciara Gillis, treated us to a dramatic reading and discussion of the first half of Lawton's work, *XIX*.

The play was commissioned in 2019 by the Women's Theatre Festival with support from the League of Women Voters of Wake County with the premise of finding a new way to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the passage of the 19th Amendment. The twist is that the play is a fictional work based upon historical evidence of black women's experience of the suffrage movement in NC at a time when our state could have played a historic role in the Amendment's passage. (Spoiler alert: North Carolina instead elected to postpone the vote.) The play weaves the threads of race, class, gender, personal freedoms and political power in a way that feels very familiar to our modern-day experience. *XIX* was intended as an opportunity to learn about black suffrage leaders left out of our history books and to imagine what their lives might have been like pushing for their rights against the backdrop of institutional racism of Jim Crow and increasing violence across the state. Audiences are encouraged to hold panel discussions about the parallels to what is happening today with voter suppression efforts, censorship in public school curriculum, and the discrimination that still exists around race, class. and sexual orientation.

The pandemic put a pause on **XIX** as a live performance piece for use during the tumultuous 2020 election year, but the hope is that it can be used now in the continued effort to pass the Equal Rights Amendment and in the 2022 election. In our Zoom discussion, members of the cast and crew shared how their experience with **XIX** related to

their experience as black women at a university with a predominantly Western-origin and its white audience focused drama department. Liz Howard (Florence) is a first-generation student and senior from Atlanta, who founded a new student organization on campus, Black Arts Theatre Company, because she saw the need for works and characters that better represented her experience. Kayla Brown (Adelaide), a junior Dramatic Art and Psychology major, is starting to write works that allow people to talk about issues related to race and mental health.

Just as I think all of us are eager to hear to rest of the story and to see **XIX** performed on stage, I think we all left knowing each of us has a role to play in the real-life work playing out before us here in year 2021 and beyond. Special thanks to Gloria Thomas, who serves as Director of the Carolina Women's Center (and lucky for us serves as Program Chair for AAUW-ODC) for this unique opportunity as we celebrate Women's History Month.

Book Group

For May, the group selected, <u>Caste: The Origins of Our</u> <u>Discontent</u> (2020) by Pulitzer Prize–winning author Isabel Wilkerson.



In this thought provoking book, the author argues that caste is a concept developed early on and across cultures/nations to rank the value of certain groups of people according to heritage, personal characteristics, religious preferences, or economic status. The superior group uses these characteristics to segregate people.

Wilkerson examines different caste systems around the world and how they damage the lives of everyone involved, even those at the top. Wilkerson argues that in order to understand how to move forward, we must examine the past, how caste applies to the US and the racial structures that keep progress as a nation at bay. (Excerpted from Short Form book summary.)

In his NYT's review, Dwight Gardner asserts, Isabel Wilkerson's book, "is an extraordinary document, one that strikes me as an instant American classic and almost certainly the

keynote nonfiction book of the American century thus far. It made the back of my neck prickle from its first pages, and that feeling never went away."

Based on a myriad of reviews, for many this is not an easy read. Some of the descriptions and comparisons are disturbing and certainly--although praise is effusive--there are a number of reviewers that have criticisms similar to Gardner's.

<u>Caste</u> is a challenging choice, perhaps, but then provocative books are the ones that most benefit from a "social" read. And for those who may be new to the group, the good news is that even when our book choices are "heavy," our conversations and connections always provide "light" and laughter.

Thanks to Zoom-master Michele, we will gather for good conversation and a chance to catch up with each other as we head toward what looks to be the spring and summer we have hoped for.
