

The Illusion of Inclusion

Did you know that only 2% of AAUW membership includes women of color? What if our vision of ourselves as well-intentioned people is at odds with the reality of who we really are and what we really think?

AAUW-Greensboro branch (co-sponsored by AAUW-NC) shared its program on this topic on Jan. 8. The speaker was Betsy Harrington of High Point. She taught in the Chapel Hill - Carrboro School System during desegregation. She is a retired program specialist for The National Conference for Community and Justice of the Piedmont Triad (NCCJ). The mission of NCCJ is fighting bias, bigotry and racism and building diverse, inclusive communities for everyone. Through her work at NCCJ and in the broader community, Betsy has facilitated many groups of adults and youth in having courageous conversations around difficult issues.

In retirement, Betsy has been an active advocate for social justice, serving on the Racial Equity Task Force at her church, on the Peace and Justice committee for the regional Presbyterian churches, on the program planning team for the Other Voices program through the Greensboro Chamber of Commerce, on the Guilford Antiracism Alliance, and as part of the Faith and Social Justice Consortium.
